PBS 45 & 49 and the Kent Stage to host "A Doo Wop Celebration!"

Stars to perform their classic hits "The Lion Sleeps Tonight," "Blue Moon," "Under the Boardwalk" and more at live concert on May 5

KENT, Ohio — March 19, 2007 — Tickets are now on sale for "A Doo Wop Celebration!" to be held on Saturday, May 5 at The Kent Stage in downtown Kent. Three of the best-loved vocal groups of the doo wop era will headline two benefit concerts, to be held at 4 p.m. and 8 p.m. The event stars The Drifters featuring Charlie Thomas, The Tokens featuring Jay Siegel and The Marcels.

Tickets are \$30 each, and a limited number of Gold Circle tickets are available at \$65 each. The Gold Circle level includes best-in-house seats, plus a private dinner reception and meet-and-greet session with members of the groups at PBS 45 & 49. The reception will be held from 6 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. at PBS 45 & 49. The station is located just 10 minutes from the Kent Stage, south of the Kent State University campus, at 1750 Campus Center Drive.

"For even the most casual doo wop fan, this is a fabulous line-up," said Lisa Martinez, vice president of marketing and development at PBS 45 & 49. "The music of The Drifters, The Tokens and The Marcels is an important part of our American musical heritage. Each group contributed major hits that are still loved today, including 'The Lion Sleeps Tonight,' 'Blue Moon,' 'Under the Boardwalk,' and 'There Goes My Baby.' We are excited to present this great concert experience in a historic local setting."

Doo wop has enjoyed a recent resurgence in popularity, thanks to PBS. In December 1999, the national broadcast of **Doo Wop 50** took the nation by storm with the premiere release of the first-ever celebration from 20 of the greatest doo wop vocal groups and their biggest hits. This success gave birth to two sequels, **Doo Wop 51**, which united an additional 30 doo wop legends, and **Rock, Rhythm and Doo Wop**, which historically preserved and presented even more legends from rock 'n' roll's Golden Age — the 1950s and early 1960s.

"Whenever we air a doo wop special, the station gets an overwhelmingly positive response from our viewers," said Martinez. "Because of this, we decided to host our own concert so that we could bring this great music directly to local people who enjoy it."

Proceeds from the concert will benefit PBS 45 & 49 and the Kent Stage, both nonprofit organizations.

About the Kent Stage

Constructed as the Flannigan and Steele Theater in 1927, the Kent Stage is the only remaining downtown theater of its kind in Portage County. The building opened as a vaudeville and movie theater and has entertained audiences in Kent for 80 years. The Western Reserve Folk Arts Association opened up the Kent Stage in 2002, continuing a tradition of providing quality entertainment in downtown Kent.
